This guide is designed to help you get the most out of your trip to the Amana Colonies, so here's what you'll find inside.

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### 1. Introduction

"Just down the road, but a whole world away", the seven villages of the historic Amana Colonies are nestled along the picturesque rolling hills of the fertile Iowa River Valley. For over 150 years the Colonies have been a treasure on the Iowa prairie, welcoming visitors to a unique experience.

Marc and I discovered this area anew when we moved here in July of 2014 to purchase **Die Heimat Country Inn**, which is the original B&B of the Amana Colonies, running since 1960. Our inn was built in 1856 as a stagecoach stop and then was a communal kitchen for the Amana folks until 1932. When we arrived, it needed a lot of TLC and Marc is a creative artist and hands on expert who can do anything this place needs. He has worked hard and it shows – Die Heimat keeps improving! We are both eager learners and jumped right into learning the history of this area and finding out about everything there is to see and do so that we can share that with you, our guests.

Although our last name, Hershberger, is German, we have no connection with the Amana folks even though we have been warmly welcomed and feel at home in this community. We are from just south of here in the Amish and Mennonite community. Yes, we are Mennonites and are easily able to answer one of the first questions that we get from our guests – What is the difference between the Amish and the Amana folks? ### 2. Where are the Amana Colonies located?

Located just minutes from I-80, (and 20 minutes from the larger cities of Iowa City and Cedar Rapids), visitors are offered the opportunity to step back from today's busy pace and to relish the comfort of locally crafted foods, furniture, art and more. The Amana Colonies offer a unique history and culture found nowhere else in the world. You will experience a rare peace in the Colonies and at our inn.



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Here you can truly escape the daily routine and experience quaint villages, meet artists, sample hearty German food, locally crafted beer and wine. Or, you can simply stroll down our quiet streets or walk our outdoor trails, enjoying the peace and tranquility of days gone by. The Colonies have something for everyone and guests come for many different reasons. I'd like to give you an overview of what we love about this area and what there is to do when you visit.

# 3. How did the Amana community begin? History in a nutshell . . .

The Amana folks are a 300-year-old religious group with historical ties to the Lutheran church in Germany. They were called the "Community of True Inspiration" because God's word was spoken to them, not only through the Bible, but through

their few inspired leaders. Upon immigrating to America, they settled first in Ebenezer, New York in 1842. Twelve years later they moved west to their current home in southeast Iowa in 1855. Within a few years all seven villages were established where the group was free to practice their religion, be self-sufficient, and live communally.





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They were communal for almost 90 years, a feat few other utopian groups of the day attained. This meant that jobs were assigned by the church elders, family groups ate in communal kitchens and everyone shared with each other and had all their needs met. There is an excellent museum in the village of Amana where a video speaks of the communal history as well as the "Great"



Change" in 1932 when the communal system was transformed into two entities: a profit sharing corporation that still manages the 26,000 acres of land purchased and the businesses begun in the 1850s, and the church which still meets for worship on Sunday mornings. Theirs is a living history that is still very much practiced.

Today the Amana Colonies are on the National Register of Historic Places. The area depends on tourists who come to learn about and experience the story they want to share, which includes a rare opportunity to relax and rejuvenate.





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## 4. The Many Festivals of the Amana Colonies . . .

Locals love to invite visitors to share in their heritage, their German festivals, foods and customs. *Oktoberfest*, celebrated the first weekend in October, is by far the

largest festival and is in its 54<sup>th</sup> year. The beer flows freely, German polka bands can be heard along the street and in the large festival tent. Men and women dress in their traditional German lederhosen and dirndls, as they ride the floats on the parade Saturday morning. If you don't like crowds this would be a weekend



to avoid - from the time the keg is tapped on Friday afternoon to the last band playing on Sunday afternoon, there are as many as 10,000 people filling up the streets of our little village of Amana! Oh, and be sure to book your room a year in advance if you want to stay in the Colonies!

# 5. What other activities can I find in the area?





Although the Colonies are always bathed in flowers of summer, *Colonies in Bloom*, features select private flower gardens that are open to the public. Since garden displays change through the summer, as various flowers reach their peak at different times, Colonies in Bloom is held the last weekend of June and the last weekend of July.

Maps are provided by the Visitors' Center that indicate the participating homes. A German flag in the front lawn indicates there is more beauty out back that you are invited to view. You'll want to make sure to visit the couple just down the street

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from us, who have a peaceful water feature and extensive gardens with benches to sit and enjoy the babbling brook and green shade.



Throwback/Model A Day, in mid-August, brings 80-100 Ford Model A's and their owners to Amana where they line up along the street and admire each other's vintage cars and invite visitors to admire them as well. We often have a parking lot full of Model A's here at Die Heimat that weekend,

which we always find quite fun. There are special activities and food to take you back in time.



Each Labor Day weekend in early September,
Catiri's Art Oasis hosts *Fresh Paint; a Plein Air Event* which attracts over 40 artists whose weekend's work is displayed at the Sunday evening dinner and show. It's fun to see the many artists creating beautiful works of art throughout the colonies that weekend. Their

paintings are for sale with the remainder on display at Catiri's Art Oasis for purchase later. **CLICK HERE** to read about many other events in the area.

### 6. Hungry? Where to Dine in the Colonies . . .



There are four large restaurants in Amana, *The Ox Yoke Inn, The Ronneburg*, the *Millstream Brau Haus*, and *P.H.A.T. Daddy's pizza*.

These are all delicious! I say, where I send you all depends on what you are in the mood for when you ask me for my

recommendation. The **Ox Yoke Inn** and the **Ronneburg** feature family-style



traditional German foods like brats, smoked pork chops, sauerbraten, schnitzels as well as fried chicken, fish, salads, sandwiches, and scrumptious desserts. FYI, the **Ox Yoke Inn** is well known for its rhubarb pie if that's your favorite. Family- style service grew out of the communal kitchen days when the Amana folks sat down and ate three family-style meals together every day. Later, although the communal kitchen tradition stopped, visitors wanted to experience a form of it, and you will too, at these restaurants. Fortunately, you can also order a single entrée off the menu, because really who can eat all that food that just keeps coming and coming?!

# 7. And Where To Enjoy A Drink . . .

The Amana folks have a long history of being brewers and vintners. As you drive by the historic sandstone, brick, or cedar wood houses you will see wooden trellises lining the side of the house with grapes growing up the side. The grapes are used for making jams and jellies and also wine. The story is that in communal days each person had a punch card



designating how much wine they could receive each year; men got 20 gallons and women 12 gallons. And besides that, most made their own wines at home. Amana



wines are sweet and fruity, but there are some newer wineries that feature more traditional German wines for a wider range of tastes.

There are 4 wineries in the village of Amana
– White Cross Cellars, Village Winery,
Ackerman Winery, and Fireside Winery in the

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Village. They all offer free tasting and stock other goodies including cheeses, wine accessories, jams, food mixes and specialty items. I assure you, there is an award-winning wine for every personal preference!



The **Millstream Brau Haus** just opened a few years ago and has a pub menu and atmosphere. It is owned by Millstream Brewery located right beside it and features their beers on tap. The **Millstream Brewery** is Iowa's oldest micro-brewery and has been around since the mid-1980s. They have a beer garden and deck seating and now, their restaurant next door. They usually have live music on the weekends throughout the summer season and even sometimes in the winter.

# 8. How many Villages make up the Amana Colonies? Actually, There Are Seven Villages . . .



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So far, I've mostly talked about what is in the largest village named *Amana*, but there are actually seven villages in all. The whole area has a population of around 1800, so we are talking small villages. Amana is the main one and people often refer to it as Main Amana. All the restaurants are located there, as well as the Woolen Mill, Furniture Store and Clock Shop, General Store, Meat Shop and Smokehouse (all owned by the Amana Society and running since the 1850s) <a href="CLICK HERE">CLICK HERE</a> to find out more about these shops.

There are many newer stores like Catiri's Art Oasis, The Noble Stone, Creative Colony featuring Iowa artisans, Midwest Leather Co., Yana's Clothing Boutique, Clothes Encounter, Michelle Miller Art Studio, Village Shop and Fudge Factory, Chocolate Haus, Custom Cutlery and Ironworks, a bakery, nine antique shops, Heritage Designs quilt shop, and other specialty shops.

### 9. Love the Outdoors?

One of my most favorite things about this area is the outdoors—both the scenery and the activities. The **Homestead Nature Trail** is a 3-mile loop in the woods that overlooks the Iowa River that displays a different view each

season of the year.

I've walked it in the spring and summer as well as through the snow, in winter. Each time, it's beautiful and refreshing.





**The Lily Lake** is most beautiful when it blooms with yellow lotus lilies in late July and early August. There is a walking trail around the lake that takes me about 45-50 minutes and follows the Millrace for part of it. I love doing this all year long as each season is unique and special to me whenever I walk the trail.

There is a **bike trail** that connects **Amana** with **Middle Amana**, with plans for



more trails connecting the Colonies with the towns around us. Recently *Amana* marked a gravel bike trail, which is a popular sport in these parts. Each summer we have **B.R.I.C** (Bike Ride Iowa County), a 36 miles ride between towns throughout the county.

I'm not a golfer, but you may be, so I must tell you about the beautiful, rolling golf course just north of *Middle Amana* that I've heard is quite a challenge AND has to be one of the prettiest places to play.

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### 10. The Fine Arts: Our Theatre ...

#### **The Old Creamery Theatre**

runs fabulous shows all season long, including a dinner theatre in the winter. Several of the 2019 shows are "The



Church Basement Ladies", a comedy, and the famous "Mama Mia". But there is a new show nearly every month throughout the year. Matinees begin at 2:00 pm on Sunday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons and Friday and Saturday evening shows begin at 7:30.

## 11. Planning a Special Event?

Amana Colonies is home to multiple event centers and wedding venues. It's the ideal destination for weddings, receptions, family reunions, car clubs and niche groups wanting a place to gather in an area where there are many things to see, many things to do, and many things to learn about. In particular, we have our Next Door Event



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**Center** right beside our inn. It used to be the Homestead General Store, so it's an historical building with wooden floors and tin ceilings. It works well for small group gatherings as well as larger groups of 100-130, and has a full kitchen and A/C

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# 12. Planning Your Trip Here? ...

There are many reasons to visit the **Amana Colonies** and there is something for everyone. You can easily spend two full days exploring the colonies and even more if you take in everything at a deeper level totally immersing yourself in the history and culture.

We are only 20 minutes from *Iowa City*, home of the **University of Iowa** and the **Hawkeye** sports teams and the **University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics**. Just beyond *Iowa City* is the **Herbert Hoover Presidential Birthplace and Library**.

**Cedar Rapids**, one of Iowa's largest cities, is 20 minutes the other direction.

Besides a wonderful **art museum**, there is the **Czech & Slovak Museum**, **African American Museum**, and **Brucemore Mansion**.

**Kalona**, the Amish community, 35 minutes south of us makes a nice day trip from here. We often get asked the difference between the Amana people and the Amish.
